PROJECT INFORMATION

Throughout the conflict, Yemen’s local governance systems have been overwhelmed by massive population displacements and the disruptions of institutions and services, challenging their ability to function effectively and posing serious implications on the sustainability of aid.

Recognizing that institutional and economic resilience are intricately interlinked, addressing both simultaneously is essential for recovery and peace. In this context, the SIERY Project works with local authorities to strengthen service delivery and advance local economic development.

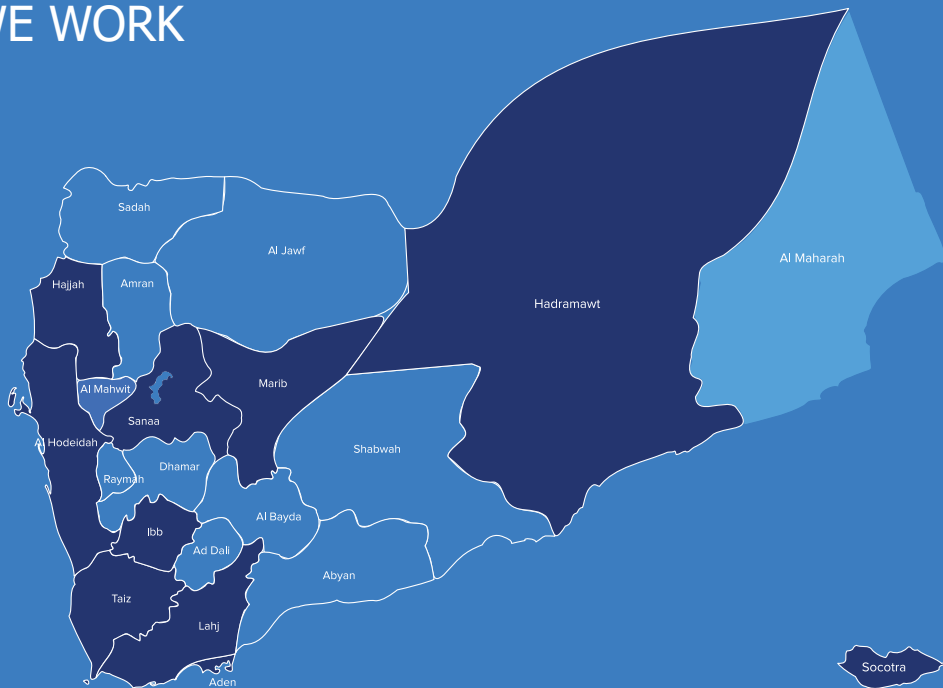

IMPACT SO FAR



45 district local authorities across 9 governorates were empowered to chart three-year District Resilience & Recovery Plans (D2RPs).



Over 125 public priorities outlined in the different D2RPs were supported for implementation, yielding impact on over six million people.



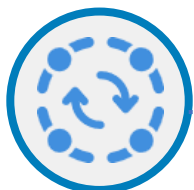
121 local authorities trained in disaster risk management.



19 CSOs were mobilized to pilot social accountability initiatives.



43 districts have increased their investment budget by funding priority projects.



To date, over 24,000 job opportunities were created or sustained while over 3,000 smallholders, small- and medium-size enterprises were supported with technical trainings and small grants.



4 value chain studies have been finalized (dates, fish, henna and wheat).



Over 70 places of education were rehabilitated, and 77 were supported with solar energy panels with a focus on places for girls and women.



22 district authorities supported with functional Women's Affairs Units.



40 gender-responsive District Capacity Development Plans were developed. 89 priorities outlined were supported.



Fish, honey and coffee markets and fish, onion and dates export centers are under construction.



321 local authorities trained in data management.



259 community members trained on community participatory planning.



429 members of District Recovery Platforms trained in leadership and communication skills (145 women, 284 men, 81 youth).
