Beautifying the Libyan South with Her Fabrics



Selected for the **UNDP's TEC+ program,** Jamela received the support and network needed to further propel her success. Today, Al-Jameelah envisions a factory employing over 50 women, aiming to become a leading fashion house in Libya and beyond.

# Najah's Story **Every Vote Counts**

2012 Apprehension hung heavy in the air as the country braced for its first free elections in 60 years. In Ubari, the tension was no different. Najah, then only 25, feared that a lack of awareness could jeopardize the entire process. Compelled to act, she launched awareness campaigns, showing her townspeople the importance of their voices in choosing their government. It was then that Najah discovered her passion for pushing for inclusive elections. Fast forward to 2019: Najah Azeem became an HNEC Ambassador, part of UNDP's program fostering electoral awareness. This network of civil activists works tirelessly to bring a deeper understanding of elections to their communities. They raise awareness in remote areas, demystifying the voting process and inspiring people to use their voices for a better future. Commission vigorously The supports the Ambassadors, empowering them to carry out their crucial work.

Today, With unwavering determination, Najah, Ubari's native daughter, continues advocating for inclusive elections. She strives to ensure that her oasis town, and indeed all of Libya, is an active participant in shaping its own future.

### The Key to Climate and Community Solutions

A Climate Change Analyst at UNDP Libya, works in areas critical to our future—climate action and food security. Her journey highlights that advancing women's empowerment in Libya is not just a moral imperative but a key driver of meaningful progress in these fields.

"Throughout my experience, I've seen the vital role women play in driving climate solutions, especially in rural communities. From managing natural resources to leading climate adaptation efforts, women often bear the weight of their communities' resilience. However, they face significant barriers, such as limited access to education, resources, and decision-making platforms," she says.

In her work, Youser is dedicated to promoting policies that address the needs of women and amplify their voices and leadership, particularly in agriculture and environmental management. 
## Emad's Journey




It's Not Just a Women's Issue.

In a conversation with Brigadier Emad AI Essawi, Associate for the Head of the Electoral Security and Protection Department at the Libyan Ministry of Interior, he emphasizes the damaging nature of online abuse, particularly its anonymity and the lasting impact on victims, stating, "Violence is violence, no matter the means."

Recognizing the significant role men play in both perpetrating and preventing violence, Brigadier Al Essawi stresses that"men have a greater responsibility to prevent and protect women from violence."He highlights the importance of acknowledging women's rights and the need for targeted outreach programs to educate men on these rights. Ultimately, he underscores the societal benefits of empowering women, asserting that"the ability of women to exercise their rights freely is a fundament of social justice – and social justice benefits men – and the society as a whole."





### **First cohort of Ra'idat**



Launched in September 2023, the Ra'idat program equipped 30 young Libyan women with essential skills in communication, advocacy, and election knowledge. This year-long initiative, led by UNSMIL in collaboration with UNDP, UNICEF, and UN Women, inclusive leadership from diverse fosters backgrounds through monthly in-person sessions and experienced mentorship.

The program underscores that democracy is about power belonging to all-not just men, the wealthy, or the most influential. It highlights that elections depend on the participation of everyone, including women. By unlocking the potential of young women in political engagement, the program empowers them to advocate for themselves and their communities.

### Hawa's Story



**Empowering Women Lawyers** for Stronger Justice Systems

#### "Since I was little, I dreamt of becoming a lawyer and pleading before the judge" says Hawa,

One of the 56 entry-level female lawyers who participated in UNDP's August training program. This program, along with similar sessions held prior, equipped these aspiring legal professionals with essential skills to represent disadvantaged groups, especially women facing conflict-related gender-based violence.

UNDP recognizes the crucial role women lawyers play in advocating for vulnerable communities and promoting gender equality. Through comprehensive training sessions like these, the organization aims to equip entry-level female lawyers with vital legal advocacy skills and Promote gender-responsiveness within justice and security mechanisms.



## Mabrouka 's Journey



Ubari's Mabrouka Back to School

Education at the Ubari's University of Sebha was halted for 7 years due the violence ravaging the oasis town in 205-2026. Students of the Faculty of Literature and Sciences, like Mabrouka had to resort to online learning, but with poor internet connection, it was not a smooth transition, "The University was in poor condition and was unsuitable for studying. We were dependent on remote studying, but studying online presented its own challenges."

With support from the European Union-funded Baladiyati project, UNDP collaborated with the Ministry of Higher Education and the Ministry of Local Government, rehabilitating the Faculty buildings in Ubari.

In January 2023, the university reopened its doors, welcoming back 400 students including Mabrouka, "The opportunity to learn in person has greatly enhanced our educational experience. Being physically present in the classroom creates a more engaging and interactive learning environment." she said.

The renewed university campus provides a long-due improvement of the educational environment, allowing students to engage with their lecturers in person and foster a deeper understanding of subjects.





### Hanan's Journey



Hanan Yousef Ben-Oun has been practising law for 23 years, as one of the members of the Tripoli General Bar Association. When she graduated in 2000 from the University of Tripoli, she launched her career, she faced challenges as she was one of the few women lawyers practising this profession over two decades ago "there was a lack of opportunity for women in and outside the courtroom" she said.

While this remains an issue today, Hanan wasn't discouraged and continued to hone her skills and expertise. Recently, she participated in a UNDP training program on international human rights standards, This training added valuable tools to her arsenal, empowering her to tackle these critical issues and advocate for those most vulnerable.

In Benghazi, we encountered Sokaina Kashbour, a 19-year-old software engineering student on a journey fueled by determination. Sokaina discovered her passion for programming at a young age, viewing it not just as a skill, but as an engaging puzzle to unravel. Her journey into IT deepened her conviction to use code for positive change, shaping the future with every line she writes. During Maharah's Demo Day in Benghazi, Sokaina and her team presented "Wejha," a mobile app designed to democratize digital skills, empowering young minds like hers to share knowledge and seize opportunities. Through Maharah, Sokaina honed her technical skills, expanding her horizons and clarifying her career path. On the role of women in tech, she asserts their historical significance, stating, "Women have always played a major role in tech, from coding to broader contributions, since its inception." With each keystroke, Sokaina and her peers are crafting their destinies, inspiring a new wave of technologists to dream, innovate, and overcome.
